JANUARY MONDAY FILMS AT 1.30PM

5th Anna Karenina 2012 (124 Mins)

This lavish and visually inventive adaptation of Leo Tolstoy's timeless novel is set in the opulent world of 19th-century Russian high society. Anna Karenina, a respected wife and mother, embarks on a passionate and forbidden love affair that places her in direct conflict with the strict moral codes of her society. As her personal happiness collides with social expectation, the film explores love, jealousy, loyalty, and the devastating cost of defying convention. A compelling and emotionally powerful classic.

12th The Talented Mr. Ripley (133 Mins)

Set against the sun-drenched backdrop of 1950s Italy, this stylish psychological thriller follows Tom Ripley, a charming but troubled young man drawn into a world of wealth, privilege, and deception. As Tom becomes increasingly obsessed with the glamorous life of Dickie Greenleaf, his desire to belong leads him down a dangerous and morally dark path. Tense, seductive, and unsettling, the film explores identity, ambition, and the high cost of living a lie.

19th The Hundred-Foot Journey (118 Mins)

26th The Salt Path (115 Mins)

Based on the bestselling memoir by Raynor Winn, this moving film follows a couple who, after losing their home and facing a devastating diagnosis, decide to walk the South West Coast Path. With little money and great uncertainty, their journey becomes one of resilience, healing, and rediscovering hope through nature. Beautifully filmed and deeply human, The Salt Path is a powerful story of endurance, love, and the restorative power of the landscape.

9th January – Dennis Apple
